## VOTING STOCKHOLDERS

The Board of Directors of AgTrust, ACA (Association) has established close of business on April 30, 2026, as the record date for voting purposes. As of the date, there were 5,867 eligible voting stockholders. Holders of Class B Common Stock as of the record date will be eligible to vote. Pursuant to the Association’s bylaws, each voting stockholder shall be entitled to one (1) vote regardless of the number of single or joint loans such voting stockholder may have with the Association. In the case of joint loans, the vote may be cast by only the stockholder designated and duly authorized by the other joint holder(s) in writing and filed with the Association. The vote of a voting stockholder that is a legal entity may be cast by an individual duly authorized in writing and filed with the Association.

The bylaws of the Association establish ten (10) Nomination Regions, and one (1) At-Large position (constituting Nomination Regions 9 & 10) for the election of Stockholder-Elected Directors and members of the Nominating Committee to ensure that representation is distributed throughout the Association’s chartered territory. Each voting stockholder, regardless of the location of the residence of the voting stockholder, is entitled to vote for each Stockholder-Elected Director and Nominating Committee position.

## ELECTION OF 2026 BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Following the 2026 Annual Stockholders’ Meeting, the voting stockholders of the Association shall elect individuals to serve for the three (3) Stockholder-Elected Director positions for Nomination Regions 2 and 7 (Seats 1 and 2). Directors elected will serve a four (4) year term.

No person shall be elected or continue to serve as a Stockholder-Elected Director unless he or she is a holder or joint holder of Class B Common Stock of the Association. In addition, an individual designated to vote by an entity may be a Stockholder-Elected Director, as long as that individual holds or jointly holds equity in the entity and meets all other requirements for serving as a Stockholder-Elected Director of the Association.

No more than one stockholder jointly sharing ownership of the Class B Common Stock of the Association may simultaneously serve as a Stockholder-Elected Director, and that individual is not required to be designated to cast votes on behalf of all the stockholders sharing ownership of the Class B Common Stock.

In order to stand for election to a Stockholder-Elected Director position, the candidate must conduct farm operations in or reside in the Nomination Region corresponding to such position. Voting stockholders who neither conduct farm operations nor reside in the Association’s chartered territory are treated as residing in the Nomination Region where the branch servicing their loans are located but are not eligible to serve as Stockholder-Elected Directors.

## VOTING PROCEDURE

All eligible voting stockholders as of close of business April 30, 2026, will receive a ballot, voting materials, and instructions by mail. Ballots may be cast by return mail or through electronic balloting. The mailed ballot will provide instructions for electronic voting. The ballots will be tabulated by an independent third party which will be responsible for validating ballots and tabulating the voting results in accordance with Farm Credit Administration (FCA) regulations and the Association’s bylaws.

Ballots must be returned within fifteen (15) business days from the date they were mailed. After the voting process, the candidate receiving the greatest number of votes for each position shall be declared elected. If a tie occurs between candidates and the candidates agree, the tie will be broken by the flip of a coin. If the candidates do not agree then the tie shall be broken by re-balloting, counted by an independent third party, and results reported to stockholders by mail or on the Association’s website, at [www.AgTrustACA.com](http://www.AgTrustACA.com)

## 2026 BOARD OF DIRECTORS OVERVIEW

The current Board is comprised of fourteen (14) Stockholder-Elected Director positions and two (2) Outside Directors. No Director attended fewer than 75% of the total Board and/or Committee meetings on which he or she served during the 2025 fiscal year. No Director resigned or declined to stand for re-election because of policy disagreements with the Board. The Stockholder-Elected Directors represent regions in the Association’s territory, with the number of voting stockholders in each Nomination Region as of April 30, 2026, listed below:

**2026 NOMINATING COMMITTEE OVERVIEW**

The Nominating Committee for the 2026 election cycle are: Hunter Williams (1 - TX), Josh Ritchey (2 - TX), Adam North (3 - TX), Jeremy Hamil (4 - TX), Ginny Minter (5 - TX), Jim Daniels (6 - TX), John Evans (7 - TX), Sean Mackey (8 - TX), Linda R. Brown (9 - NM), Cassandra Gray (10 - NM), and Russell Leonard (At-Large 9 & 10 - NM). The Association's Nominating Committee met on February 13, February 20, February 27, March 5, March 6, March 9, and April 28, 2026.

**ELECTION OF 2027 NOMINATING COMMITTEE**

Following the 2026 Annual Stockholders' Meeting, the voting stockholders of the Association shall elect a Nominating Committee consisting of a total of one (1) stockholder to serve as a member and one (1) stockholder to serve as an alternate for each of the Association's ten (10) Nomination Regions and the one (1) At-Large position.

No more than one (1) stockholder jointly sharing ownership of the Class B Common Stock of the Association may simultaneously seek election to the Nominating Committee, and that individual is not required to be designated to cast votes on behalf of all the stockholders sharing ownership of the Class B Common Stock. Each member of the Nominating Committee must conduct farm operations or reside in the Nomination Region corresponding to the seat.

Voting stockholders who neither conduct farm operations nor reside in the Association's chartered territory are treated as residing in the Nomination Region where the branch servicing their loans are located but are not eligible to serve as members of the Nominating Committee.

Each voting stockholder will be asked to cast one (1) vote in each Nomination Region and At-Large position. The stockholder receiving the greatest number of votes for each Nomination Region shall be declared the member elected for a one-year term as a member of the 2027 Nominating Committee. The candidate receiving the next highest number of votes for each Nomination Region shall serve as an alternate for the respective Nomination Region.

## FLOOR NOMINATIONS

Additional nominations may be made from the floor during the Annual Meeting for both Stockholder-Elected Director and Nominating Committee member open position(s). Each nominator must be a voting stockholder of the Association or individual designated in accordance with the bylaws to vote the Class B Common Stock held by a voting stockholder. Each nominee must be a holder or joint holder of Class B Common Stock of the Association or an individual designated to vote the Class B Common Stock held by an entity.

No person shall be nominated, elected or appointed, or allowed to continue to serve, if that person is the spouse, parent, sibling, natural or adopted child, mother-in-law, father-in-law, sister-in-law, son-in-law or daughter-in-law of a: (i) Director of the Association, (ii) nominee for election to the Board, (iii) member or alternate of the Nominating Committee, (iv) nominee for election to the Nominating Committee, or (v) salaried officer of the Association.

The floor nominee must be present during the Annual Meeting to state whether he or she accepts the nomination. Nominations from the floor require a "second" at the meeting before being placed on the ballot. Upon receiving a floor nomination, the Annual Meeting process will stop until initial eligibility is determined. After initial eligibility is determined, the meeting will proceed. Subsequent due diligence will be performed to determine if the nominee meets all the eligibility requirements imposed by FCA regulations and the Association's bylaws and policies. Floor nominees meeting all eligibility requirements will be placed on the ballot mailed to the voting stockholders at the conclusion of the meeting.




